Understanding the Three Realms

understanding of these realms helps illuminate how God governs creation, how humanity fits within His design, and how the visible and invisible interact.

Definition of the Spiritual Realm

The **spiritual realm** is the unseen, eternal dimension where God's presence is fully manifest and where spiritual beings operate. It is not bound by physical laws such as time, space, or matter. Definition of the Celestial Realm

The celestial realm demonstrates God's order, precision, and power. The movement of heavenly bodies governs time, seasons, and cycles of life on earth (Genesis 1:14–18). It is a realm of structure and beauty, revealing God's wisdom through its vastness and complexity.

While it is part of the visible creation, the celestial realm also points beyond itself. It declares the glory of God (Psalm 19:1), serving as a testimony to His invisible attributes. Thus, it holds both physical and symbolic significance, bridging the seen and unseen.

Definition of the Terrestrial Realm

2 Corinthians 4:18 further distinguishes between what is seen and unseen, elevating the unseen as eternal. This places the spiritual realm above the others in terms of permanence and ultimate reality.

Romans 1:20 adds another layer of understanding by stating that God’s invisible qualities—His eternal power and divine nature—are clearly seen through what has been made. This means the visible realms (celestial and terrestrial) serve as reflections or expressions of the invisible spiritual reality.

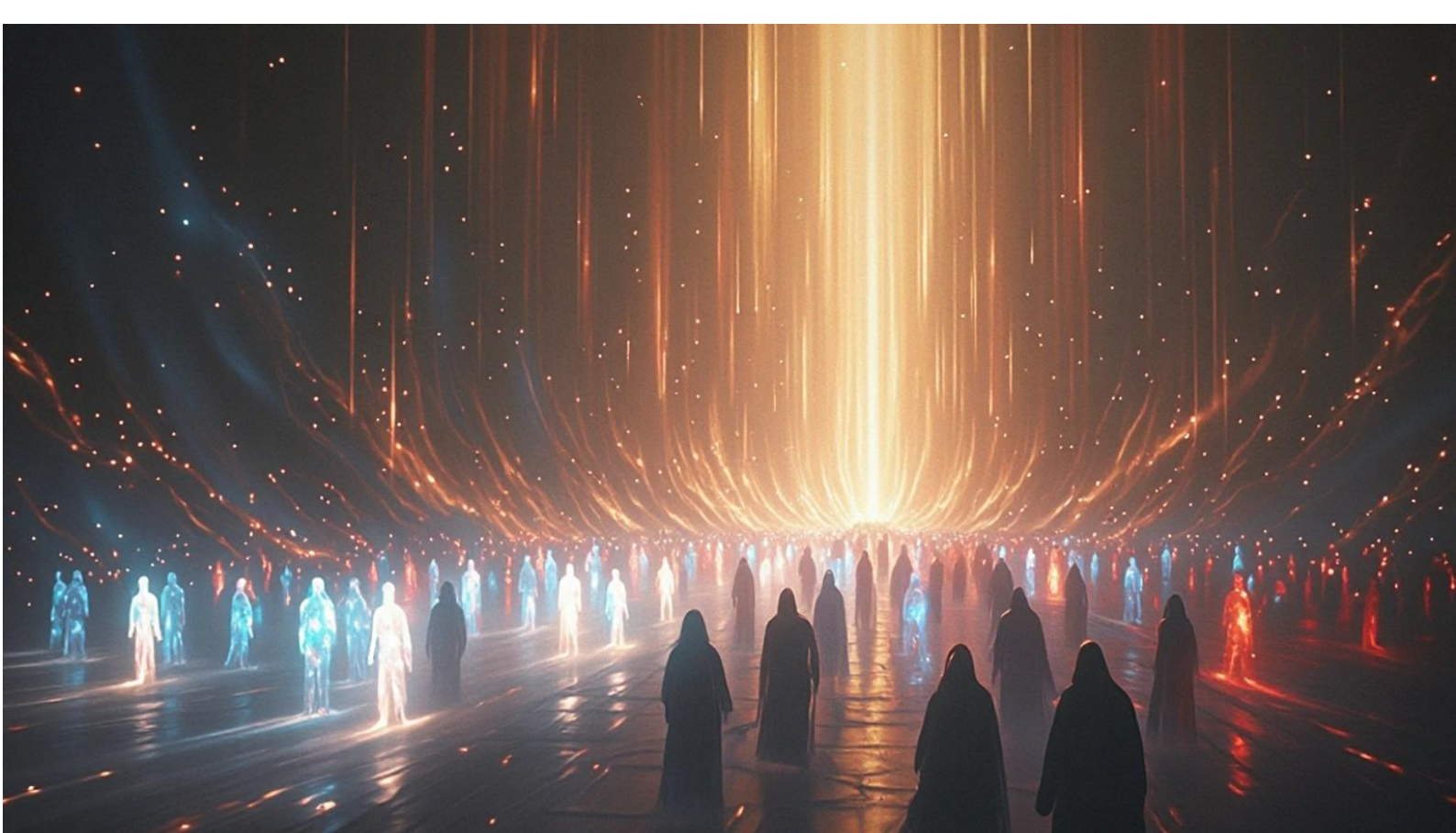
